Hi Everybody!


Happy New Year! 2021!

What a pile of TL cards it turned out to be!! Thanks to everybody who participated!



I had fun with my own card! Did you recognize the photo? It's from a black and white, close-out ad for the TL pets from the **August**, **1957 TL Monthly Magazine**. I remember my own excitement in 1996 when I spotted a real TL Scottie complete with plaid blanket and leash, shown by an unsuspecting antique china dealer among her cups and saucers. I relied on my memory of the Aug. '57 photo to identify it.

Fully dressed, the pets are among the rarest of all TL items, and their clothing is untagged! The dogs, in addition, are not well documented in the TL books and many collectors are unaware that there were two. Peggy's first book shows wonderful monkey photos, but none of the Scottie, and only a small, easily missed poodle pic. Can you find it? In 11/1998, TL and Scottie appeared on the cover of the <u>DC</u> with an article on Scottie by **chattipatty**. Best ever coverage of the monkeys & their clothes, written by **Sandy Dorsey**,




appeared in that same <u>DC</u> issue. But beware! **Jean Longway** copied Penelope's outfit and she sewed *a lot* of them...




2020 has been a year of re-organization.

A new excel document is up on terrileedolls.com with new searchable tabs.



How do you navigate the excel workbook?

- 1. Press "CTRL or control" and left click all the tabs at bottom of the workbook.
- 2. Press "Control F". A **Find and Replace box** opens on your screen. Type in what you wish to find, in the example below *Patterns* has been typed in using the "FIND" search.
- Press "Find Next". If a message pops up that states "we couldn't find what you are looking for"; It may be because all the tabs at bottom were not highlighted. If this occurs go back and repeat step No. 1
- Magic has happened and you are now in the correct tab in the section for Patterns. Close the Fin and Replace box and scroll through all the items in Patterns.





You can find just about anything using these simple search tools. Have fun searching articles written over the 30-years that the Terri Lee Newsletter and The Daisy Chain have been published.

There was the red Heart Flocked Dress and another with green Shamrocks. A Skater with Sequins and so many other formals with sequins and of course; The Formal Coat.









As you can see from the photos on this page The Terri Lee Doll Company found ways to place

glamour and elegance in so many ways. Sequins were often lined up on the shoulders or swirled across a bodice or skirt.

Sequins or brightly colored brads were never left out of the fashion decorations

The End of an Era

The wonderful Terri Lee doll transitioned through many changes 1946 and between The company 1962. evolved from making composition dolls Lincoln Nebraska to making plastic dolls in Los Angeles. Although the doll materials, the artists and the boxes the molds changed, remained the same. After the fire in Apple Valley in 1958 some



red bow boxes appeared at Macy's on the west coast with different dolls dressed in Terri Lee clothing.

In 1960 Violet Gradwohl was back in business as Magna Enterprises, Inc in the Los Angeles area. Vi's involvement changed from Magna to Mar-Fan to I & S all in the Los Angeles Area. Collectors call this the



"Mar-Fan Era" of Terri Lee. Mar-Fan dolls are usually found in red and white stripped boxes and sometimes green and white stripped boxes.

This was the era of Talking Terri Lee. Some of the same costumes can be found in this era as the previous era but there were new fashions which were just found in



this later era. Fashion Parades and Monthly Booklets were no longer being sent out. A few booklets of information from this era can be found. Many of the dolls made in this era were completed with left over fashions an materials.

It seemed to be an era of utilizing the dolls, outfits, and materials from a previous time.

Here is a beautiful doll of that later She has a wonderful face and "yellow chick hair" which is rare. Her clothing is that associated with the Mar-Her flowers and hat are Fan Era. typical of the Mar-Fan era. She has no daisy on her wrist and no daisies on her hat. She is wearing plain white plastic shoes associated with Mar-Fan Era. Her underwear is a typical one piece. The box seems to indicate, "We are nearing the End of an Era," as only the top is red and white stripped and the bottom of the box is plain brown cardboard. She is not a talking Terri

Lee but has a hole in the back of her neck where a speaker could

have been connected. Her clothes are tagged with embroidered tags. There are no booklets with doll. The box has indication of the no contents. I was told many years ago that a lot of these dolls were sold by a discount store in the Los Angeles Area called "Pic and Save".

In most cases a pretty slip and panties accompany most boxed dolls. And during the Mar-Fan era the slips were just as pretty. Tiny Terri Lee's slip ties at the shoulders, her ship has Val lace sewn under the cotton lace.

School Dress

This school dress is even more elusive than any of Terri's dresses. I could not find any documentation in the Fashion Parade or the monthly magazines of the dress. Which is surprising since I have found it in three variations. All versions have the printed tag,

which puts it in the 1952 era. On closer look at the 1952 price guide under a section not pictured is dress #530A Terri in School Dress Gingham or Chambray \$13.95 doll with the dress and the dress alone costing \$1.75. Also mentioned is Jerri in short pants and shirt costing \$13.95 and the outfit without a doll \$2.00. The item number description is broad enough that perhaps this could be the number for this dress and shorts outfit might be ordered under. The dress comes with the Quaker yoke and collar, the variations give dress a different look. The sleeves are part of the dress bodice and not set in.

The first version has the Quaker yoke in white with a bow,







Version two is what I think the price guide was referring to in the chambray fabric. I have both Terri and Jerri wearing this version. Other colors are green, blue and rose. Notice the bow is missing from this version.

In the December 2009 issue Dennis Ross let us know the stripes come in wide as well as narrow spacing as often seen on some of the Family style costumes.



A third version of this dress is plain fabric

combined with a variation of the plain fabric with dots woven in the fabric. The yoke and

skirt have the dots while the collar and bodice is the plain fabric. It comes in several colors, blue, brown, green, and rose. I have not seen a Jerri outfit to match.

Inspired by the late great Babe Ruth & the World Series Red Sox! Unfortunately the doll was

never mass produced.

Roller Skating was a fun activity in the 50's who doesn't remember having those slip-on skates with the key that always got lost? In 1956 Tiny Terri Lee added a roller-skating outfit to her wardrobe item # 3168 which costed \$5.79. Tiny Terri Lee's skating outfit is not like big Terri Lee's skating outfit made of ninon and ruffled net, with an exceptionally large bonnet, instead her roller-skating outfit resembles the toe dancer costume. The outfit is made of taffeta with the bodice ending in a V. Netting forms the shoulder straps and is across the neckline. The skirt has three layers of netting. This outfit comes with a matching

rayon bonnet and panties. The colors are in pastels shades of pinks, yellow, and blue.

To complete the outfit are the skates. Pictured in the Fashion Parade are the tie skates however two styles were available, and a doll might come with the slip-on style.






Terri Lee's Shoulder Bag

The purse comes in red, green and white felt but my childhood one was white and that






Below is a white felt purse with a solid white snap.







Little Mother Sews a Skaters Hat for Tiny Terri Lee

Here we are again with those little things that get lost. I hope this will help you complete your Tiny Terri Lee Skaters outfit, it would be a shame for her not to have her bonnet!!

Materials: ¹/₄ yard fabric

1 yard of ¼" ribbon

Thread


Instructions: Sew all seams a scant ¼" (* by scant I mean if you make this seam over ¼" it will be too small for Tiny Terri Lee)

The hat is completely lined with the same fabric.

- 1. Make a small clip as noted on hat BRIM.
- 2. With right sides together stitch CROWN to BRIM on the side marked with an (A).
- 3. Fold up 1/4" at bottom of CROWN on both sides of the hat
- 4. With right sides together matching all edges stitch completely around the bonnet leaving the hem open for turning right side out.
- 5. Turn right side out.
- 6. Stitch up the folded edge at hem.
- 7. Add ribbon ties to hat at (X).

A tear in the lining which would not show, but there is a snaggley tear about 1/2" on sleeve near shoulder, and a microscopic ballpoint pen mark on side of skirt -- maybe someone knows a way to heal the damage on the sleeve. \$70
- 3. Gorgeous cranberry red just the coat, no hat beautiful outside but lining has light brown speckles all over. \$60
- 4. Coral velvet with matching hat that has fur puffs tagged lining excellent however one sleeve has a darkish smudge, light but there. \$90
- 5. Blue rich dark, not navy, much prettier than navy matching hat with ties (no tag) This is the style with the V-shaped collar in the back lining great. \$95
- 6. Here is a matching outfit set for Terri and Jerri: in light/medium blue pique': Terri jacket with eyelet cuffs, pleated skirt, white blouse, straw hat with blue ties excellent, however hat has a teeny bite out of it.
